NEC Football Offensive Player of the Week

Josh Dudash, Stony Brook

Jr., QB, 6-2, 214, Beachwood, NJ/Toms River South

Dudash was outstanding in Stony Brook's 30-20 win over St. Francis (PA) on Saturday to give the Seawolves three-straight wins and a tie for first place with Robert Morris in the league standings. The junior signal caller completed an astounding 22-of-27 passes for 314 yards and two touchdowns. The Beachwood, NJ native's two passing scores were from long distance, connecting with Dwayne Eley on a 34-yarder in the second quarter and Lynell Suggs on a 40-yarder in the fourth quarter. Dudash earns his third career NEC Offensive Player of the Week award and first this season. On the season, Dudash has completed 63.0 percent (92-146) of his attempts, while throwing six touchdowns and no interceptions.

NEC Football Defensive Player

Jeff Rommes, Robert Morris

Sr., LB, 6-0, 200, Gibsonia, PA/Deer Lakes

A consistent contributor throughout his Colonial career, Rommes posted one of his best games a 23-17 overtime win against nationally-ranked Central Connecticut State on Saturday, establishing a career high with 18 tackles, including seven solo. The senior also tallied three tackles for a loss, a fumble recovery, pass breakup and an interception. Rommes' 18 tackles ties for the second most in RMU single-game history, joining former Colonial linebacker James Noel (2002-05), who collected 18 tackles twice. The Gibsonia, PA product posted five tackles in the first overtime. With CCSU 2nd-and-goal from the RMU five-yard line, Central tailback Justise Hairston rushed to the one-yard line before being met head on and stopped by Rommes. The senior's fumble recovery in the second quarter, on a Ryan Holmes turnover, was followed by an RMU drive which resulted in a touchdown. On CCSU's next possession Rommes picked off Holmes and rumbled 47 yards to the CCSU eight-yard line before the Colonials settled for a field goal on the ensuing drive. Currently on the season, Rommes ranks seventh in the NEC in tackles (55), tied for eighth in sacks (2.5) and fourth in tackles-for-loss (7.5).

NEC Football Special Teams Player of the Week

Sean Dennis, Monmouth

Sr., P, 5-11, 180, Westampton, NJ/Holy Cross

Dennis punted seven times for 288 yards for an average of 41.1 yards in a 28-7 win at Wagner on Saturday. Dennis' longest punt was a 62-yarder that was downed on the Seahawks' one-yard line. Dennis had three of his seven punts downed inside the 20 (1, 17 and 12 yard lines). Ten of Dennis' 24 punts this season have landed inside the opponents' 20 yard line.

NEC Football Rookie of the Week

Cory Giddings, Stony Brook

Fr., DB, 6-0, 170, Ocean, NJ/Ocean Township

Giddings was again at the center of big plays by the Stony Brook defense in the Seawolves' 30-20 win over Saint Francis (PA). After the Red Flash climbed within 14-6, Giddings recovered a blocked PAT and raced 85 yards to the unusual defensive PAT conversion to give Stony Brook a 16-6 lead at halftime. With SBU holding a 16-13 lead in the third quarter and St. Francis driving for the go-ahead score, Giddings intercepted an Anthony Doria pass in the endzone to thwart the drive. The Seawolves would score on the ensuing possession and go on to win. Giddings also collected eight tackles in the game and earns back-to-back NEC Rookie of the Week awards.

Central Connecticut State Drops Out of Top-25 I-AA Poll

Following a 23-17 double-overtime loss to first-place Robert Morris on Saturday, Central Connecticut State has been knocked out of The Sports Network I-AA National Poll. The Blue Devils moved to as high as 19th in the poll after scoring better than 60 points in consecutive weeks. The Blue Devils had become the first team in league history to be ranked in consecutive weeks. CCSU had also been ranked three weeks this season with its first coming on Sept. 18.

Five NEC Teams On TSN I-AA Mid Major Top-10 Poll; San Diego holds No. 1 Mid-Major Ranking

Philadelphia, PA (Sports Network) - With a showdown at Drake looming next week, the San Diego Toreros notched another easy win by dispatching Valparaiso, 68-7, to improve to 6-0 for the season on Saturday and maintain the No. 1 spot in The Sports Network I-AA Mid-Major Top 10. The Toreros are at No. 1 for the eighth time this season and 14th poll in a row overall, and have a 14-game winning streak over the past two seasons. They earned a unanimous nod at the top spot with all 25 first-place votes and 250 total points.

Drake moves to No. 2 before this week's Pioneer Football League matchup with the top-ranked Toreros. The Bulldogs have won their last six games and own a 6-1 record this season after winning, 29-0, at Butler on Saturday. The next two teams in the poll also meet this weekend, with No. 3 Monmouth heading to No. 4 Robert Morris in a key Northeast Conference tilt. Both teams moved up a spot after beating a fellow top ten team on Saturday, as Monmouth knocked off Wagner, 28-7, and Robert Morris trumped Central Connecticut State, 23-17, in a double overtime thriller. Central Connecticut State dropped three places to No. 5 after the loss to the Colonials. Albany is at No. 6, with Duquesne at No. 7, Stony Brook at No. 8, Davidson at No. 9 and Jacksonville at No. 10. Davidson and Jacksonville enter the poll this week, while Dayton and Wagner drop out. Dayton is out of the Mid-Major Top 10 for the first time since the inception of the poll in 2001.

Every team in the top 10 is in action this week, with San Diego's visit to Drake and Monmouth's trip to Robert Morris highlighting the schedule.

NEC Football Review: Robert Morris, Stony Brook Remain Unbeaten In NEC; Monmouth, Albany Prevail

Robert Morris (5-2, 3-0 NEC) and Stony Brook (3-4, 3-0 NEC) continued their winning ways on Saturday and remain undefeated in conference play. The Colonials needed two overtime periods to hold off No. 19 ranked Central Connecticut State (5-2, 1-2 NEC), 23-17, at Joe Walton Stadium to win their fifth straight. After a potential game-winning field goal by CCSU was missed wide right in the first overtime, RMU held the Blue Devils offense in the second overtime and then quarterback Erik Cwalinski threw a 14-yard TD to wideout Mario Hines to win the game. In the loss, CCSU runner Justise Hairston ran for 256 yards and two scores.

After scoring only 22 points in its first four games, the Seawolves have netted 30 or more points in each of their last three NEC games after toppling Saint Francis (PA), 30-20, at Loretto. The SBU offense was led the quarterback Josh Dudash, who threw for 314 yards on 22-of-27 passing and two touchdowns.

Monmouth (6-1, 2-1 NEC) won its second straight, knocking off Wagner (4-3, 0-3 NEC), 28-7, on Staten Island. Freshman tailback David Sinisi rushed for 107 yards and a touchdown for the Hawks, while quarterback Brian Boland converted two passing scores.

Albany (4-3, 2-1 NEC) prevailed, edging Sacred Heart (2-5, 1-2 NEC), 24-13, at Fairfield. Great Danes running back Marcus Allen was superb, gaining 149 on just 15 carries and two touchdowns, including a 65-yarder in the third quarter.

Gensler - Playing Behind The Line

Robert Morris defensive lineman Ray Gensler, a second-team ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American last year, is playing behind his opponents' line of scrimmage more than anyone in the NEC this season. Gensler ranks second in I-AA football in tackles-for-loss per game (1.86) and second

in sacks per game (1.29). Currently, the senior has 47 tackles, 13.0 TFL and 9.0 sacks on the season. On Oct. 14, in a 23-17 overtime win versus nationally-ranked Central Connecticut State, Gensler played outstandingly, collecting 15 tackles (5 solo) and 1.5 tackles-for-loss. Last season, Gensler totaled 6.5 TFL and a half sack.

Giddings Sets NCAA Fumbles Record

Stony Brook defensive back Cory Giddings etched his name in the record books, becoming the first player in recorded college football history to return three fumbles in a game and first since Alvin Nnabuife of SMU in 2004 to return two for touchdowns. After a scoreless first quarter versus Albany on Oct. 9, Giddings put the homecoming crowd into a frenzy, picking up a fumble and racing seven yards for a touchdown with 10:52 left in the first half. Giddings struck again with 3:50 left in the half, scooping up a fumble and delighting the crowd of 6,688 with a terrific return down the sideline for a score. Late in the fourth quarter, the Ocean, NJ product halted the Great Danes' attempt at a comeback, recovering another fumble in Albany territory.

Hairston Gears Up For Record Setting Season

Central Connecticut State tailback Justise Hairston, a transfer from Rutgers, is compiling perhaps the greatest single-season individual performance in NEC history. Currently, Hairston leads I-AA football in all-purpose yards per game (222.0), rushing (178.4) and ranks third in scoring (84 points). The senior is averaging 7.6 yards per rush and needs only 228 yards in the next four games to break Albany running back Gary Jones' NEC record for yards in a season. Hairston has 1,247 yards through seven games, which ranks eighth all-time. Jones rushed for 1,524 yards in 2002. Hairston is also within striking distance of the single-season rushing touchdowns mark of 22 also set by Jones in 2001. Hairston enters his final four games with 14 scores on the season. In the last two games alone, the New Britain, CT native is averaging 294 yards per game. Versus Saint Francis (PA) on Oct. 7, Hairston gained a NEC single-game record 332 yards and tied the mark for touchdowns with five.

Palko, Caputo Set I-AA Receiving Record

Red Flash senior wide receivers Michael Caputo and Luke Palko broke the NCAA Division I-AA record for "most career passes caught by two players on the same team." Caputo had five catches and Palko caught one on Oct. 2 versus Robert to bring their combined career total 426, breaking a 20-year-old record formerly held by Texas Southern's Darrell Colbert and Donald Narcisse, who combined for 420 catches during their careers. Through the games of Oct. 14, Caputo and Palko have combined for 445 catches. Palko, who has missed the last two games due to an ankle sprain, is the NEC's all-time leader with 223 catches, followed closely by Caputo with 222.

Wagner Kicker Piotr Czech Drills 54-Yarder

Wagner junior kicker Piotr Czech booted the longest field goal in Northeast Conference history on Saturday at Sacred Heart on Sept. 30, walloping a 54-yarder as time expired in the first half of play. The previous conference record of 50 yards was also set by a Seahawk - Blake Abbot in 2001. Czech's 54-yarder is the second longest in I-AA football this season.

- Central Connecticut State runner Justise Hairston leads I-AA in all-purpose yards per game (222.0 ypg) and rushing yards per game (178.4 ypg).
- Monmouth wide receiver Adam San Miguel, who leads the NEC with 51 catches, is third in I-AA in receptions per game this season (7.29).
- Saint Francis (PA) receiver Michael Caputo became with NEC's all-time career leader in receiving yards. Caputo, who now has 3,130 yards, added 88 yards on Sept. 23 versus La Salle, passing Monmouth's Miles Austin (2,867).
- For the first time in league history, the NEC beat an Atlantic 10 opponent as Albany knocked off Delaware, 17-10, on September 16.
- Sacred Heart returner Evin Jones ranks fourth in I-AA in kickoff return average (30.82).
- The NEC finished the non-conference season with a 3-3 record versus Patriot League teams. Albany topped Lehigh on Sept. 2, while Monmouth beat Fordham on Sept. 2 and Colgate on Sept. 23.
- With 226 yards in a win over Saint Peter's on September 16, Monmouth's Brian Boland became the fourth quarterback in league history to throw for 6,000 career yards. Boland now stands in third with 6,753 yards behind RMU's Tim Levick (7,222) and SFPA's Anthony Doria (7,771).
- Albany junior linebacker Colin Disch leads the NEC in tackles (72) and ranks 20th in I-AA football (10.29 tpg). Sacred Heart linebacker Jon Corto ranks second in the NEC and 30th in I-AA in tackles per game (10.00 tpg).
- Saint Francis (PA) tailback Todd Harris now ranks fifth on the all-time career NEC rushing list with 2,870 yards. Harris gained 107 yards versus Stony Brook on Oct. 14, the twelfth 100-yard performance of his career. Harris stands behind Albany's Gary Jones (2002-03), who gained 3,033 yards.
- With 192 catches, Wagner senior wide receiver Chris Turner broke the Wagner record for most career catches on Oct. 7, passing former teammate Shaun Grover (181), who set the mark last season. Turner ranks third on the NEC list for career receptions and yards (2,680) and is the active NEC leader with 32 touchdowns.

- Albany posted its first victory since a pair of national top-25 wins in September with a 24-13 triumph at Sacred Heart on Oct. 14 ... The Great Danes, who won for the fifth consecutive time in the series, rushed for 300 net yards, the 20th time in the program's I-AA history they have reached that mark ... Albany racked up 445 total yards, the highest figure since Oct. 9, 2004 ... Tailback **Marcus Allen (Fayetteville, NC/Seventy-First)** ran for a career-best 149 yards and two TDs. Allen surpassed the 1,000-career mark (1,095) in his Albany career ... Tailback **Omar Johnson (Edgewater Park, NJ/Burlington City)** carried 27 times for 135 yards ... Allen and Johnson became the first pair of 100-yard rushers in a game since Sept. 13, 2003 ... Albany's defense held Sacred Heart to 220 total yards, including 14 net yards on the ground ... Defensive tackle **Tom Pandolf (Holbrook, NY/Sachem)** made a season-high five tackles and recorded two of his team's four sacks, both in the fourth quarter ... Cornerback **Ryan Chrobak (Clinton, NY/Clinton Central)** added four tackles, one sack, one forced fumble and one pass break-up ... Chrobak moved into 28th place on the school's career tackles chart with 170 ... Safety **Dave Nicomini (Newton, NJ/Kittatinny Regional)** sealed the outcome when he collected his first career interception with 2:35 remaining ... Free safety **Dave Casale (Troy, NY/Troy)** had a career-best six tackles in his first start as a collegian ... Placekicker **Jason Fralicker (North Tonawanda, NY/North Tonawanda)** booted a career-long 39-yard field goal in the final period, the longest kick by a Great Dane since Sept. 28, 2002 ... Albany's defense is ranking nationally in scoring against (21st), total defense (22nd) and rushing yards allowed (25th) ... Flanker **David McCarty (Gansevoort, NY/LaSalle Institute)** had three receptions, the first of his career, for 58 yards and one touchdown last week ... McCarty's 31-yard TD catch in the first quarter came off a tipped ball ... Split end **Irani DeAraujo (Queens, NY/Choate Rosemary Hall Prep)** moved into a tie for 13th in career receptions (59) ... Albany's Homecoming & Family Weekend is set for Oct. 21 against Saint Francis (PA) ... Albany has a 22-11 record in homecoming games ... **Steve Shoen (Syracuse, NY/Christian Brothers Academy)** will be enshrined into the Albany Athletic Hall of Fame on Friday evening ... Shoen, a veteran of the Persian Gulf War as Commanding Officer of the USS Avenger, was an All-America defensive lineman in the late 1970s.

- CCSU lost for the second time this season on the road to a conference opponent dropping a 23-17 double overtime decision to Robert Morris on Saturday afternoon. ... CCSU, who was ranked 19th in the country prior to the game, falls to 5-2 overall on the season and 1-2 in NEC play with the loss ... CCSU had its chances to win missing an opportunity to attempt the game-winning field goal as the clock ran out in regulation with the ball at the RMU 12-yardline and then missing an 18-yard field goal attempt the would have won the game at the end of the first overtime ... The Blue Devils turned the ball over on their possession in the second overtime and then RMU capitalized with its third touchdown pass of the game to earn the victory ... The Blue Devil defense came up big in the second half as CCSU came back from a 10-point halftime deficit to force overtime ... The defense held RMU to 83 total yards in the second half of play and did not allow the Colonials to cross midfield in the half ... Senior defensive back **Farod Muhammad (Buffalo, NY/Hutchinson Central Tech)** had his most productive game of the season in a 23-17 double overtime loss on the road at Robert Morris on Saturday afternoon. Muhammad had a season-high 15 tackles, including five for a loss, a forced fumble and a sack ... The Blue Devil defense forced three Colonial turnovers on the game including the forced fumble on a sack by Muhammad in the third quarter. He had nine solo tackles in the game ... CCSU running back **Justise Hairston (New Britain, CT/New Britain)**, the nation's leading rusher in I-AA, rushed a school record 49 times for 256 yards and a pair of touchdowns ... Hairston's day included a 61-yard touchdown run in the first quarter, his fifth touchdown run of over 50 yards this season ... Hairston now has 1,247 rushing yards in seven games this season and 14 touchdowns averaging 178.1 yards per game. He has five 100 yard rushing days and three of over 200. In the last three weeks alone he has rushed for 182, 331 and 256 yards, a total of 769 yards ... Hairston is averaging 7.6 yards per carry this season and also leads the nation in all-purpose yards per game ... On Saturday he had five rushes of 10 or more yards giving him 28 on the season in seven games. Hairston is only 166 yards shy of setting the single-season rushing record at CCSU currently held by CCSU all-time leading rusher Stan House (1,413). His 1,247 yards in seven games puts him 12th on the CCSU all-time rushing yardage list. He is 277 yards shy of the NEC single-season rushing record held by Gary Jones of Albany (1,524) and he has four games remaining this season.

MU senior cornerback **David Jiles (Paulsboro, NJ/Paulsboro)** picked off his third pass of the year against Wagner, giving him 11 career interceptions, which ties him for first all-time ... Three of Monmouth's four scoring drives against the Seahawks lasted under two minutes (1:25, 1:15, 1:52) ... Monmouth has doubled their opponents in scoring this season, 171-85 ... For the second straight week the Hawks were perfect in redzone scoring, going 3-for-3 ... Wagner's offense was 0-1 in the redzone, credit the Hawk defenders who are the NEC's top-ranked scoring defense ... For the seventh time this season the Hawks have controlled the time of possession, this time 34:53 to 25:07 ... Saturday's game saw a total of six punts travel 50+ yards, two for Monmouth and four for Wagner ... The Hawks were 8-of-16 on third down, conversely the Wagner offense was just 2-of-13 in the same category ... Junior **Chris Kiley (Point Pleasant, NJ/Point Pleasant Boro)** caught a 40-yard touchdown pass on Saturday for his only catch of the game ... **Mike McClelland (Lincroft, NJ/Middletown South)** led the Hawks with four receptions for 44 yards, including a long of 27 ... The double overtime game marked the first time Robert Morris ever went into overtime at home in the program's 13-year history and improved the club to 2-2 in extra frame games ... Despite not completing a pass in the second half, **Erik Cwalinski (Jacobsburg, OH/Shadyside)** came through in the clutch in double overtime, leading Robert Morris to the upset with a 14-yard touchdown pass to junior wide receiver **Mario Hines (Ecorse, MI/Ecorse)** ... Cwalinski completed 8-of-9 passing attempts for 180 yards in the first half in helping the Colonials build a 17-7 halftime edge, throwing touchdown passes of 35 yards (on a flea flicker) to sophomore wideout **Sherrod Evers (Philadelphia, PA/Mastbaum Area)** and 65 yards to senior tight end **Jarvis Powers (Stafford, VA/Brooke Point)** ...
