Lloyd continued her torrid scoring pace in the NEC, posting four goals and a pair of assists in a 2-0 week for the Blue Devils as they clinched the top seed in this week's NEC Tournament as well as the regular season crown. Lloyd, who finished the regular season with a three-way league-high tie of 11 goals - all coming in the last 12 games -, scored two and added an assist in the win over Saint Francis (PA) at home on Friday. Those 11 goals ties for the third-highest single season total in school history. She scored the first goal of the game for CCSU then later assisted on a goal and scored the final goal of the game. On Sunday, she matched her performance from Friday with an identical five points. She scored the first and second goals of the game for CCSU in the 4-0 win over Robert Morris and assisted on the third goal. Nine of her goals on the year came against league opponents, and she had four game-winners. This is the junior's second adidas/NEC Women's Soccer Player of the Week honor.

NEC Women's Soccer Notes *(through games of November 1)*

Around The League:

NEC Tournament History: Long Island finished first in the regular season last year but ultimately lost to Central Connecticut State in the finals 1-0. LIU and CCSU will face each other in the semifinals this season. Quinnipiac was not in the Tournament last season but ranks third this year and will face Monmouth, who is ranked second for the fourth time since 1995. CCSU has participated in post-season tournaments 10 out of the 14 on record, winning seven times. MU has participated in 12, winning three. QU has played in four, winning one time. And LIU has played in six, winning twice. **Academic Honor:** Robert Morris junior **Christy Baldesberger (South Park, PA/South Park)** was named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District II Second Team. **Tournament Time:** The 2009 NEC Women's Soccer Tournament will take place at Central Connecticut State University this weekend on Nov. 6 and 8. No. 1-seeded CCSU will take on No. 4-seeded LIU at 11:00 a.m. on Friday, and No. 2-seeded MU will face No. 3-seeded QU at 1:30 p.m. The winner of each game will play in the championship match Sunday, Nov. 8 in a 1:00 p.m. kickoff. The winner of the NEC Tournament will receive the league's automatic bid to the NCAA Women's Soccer College Cup.

Team By Team Notes:

Bryant (4-12-2, 2-6-2 NEC)

The Bulldogs celebrated senior day on Sunday at home against Wagner where six seniors were honored. Bryant had to come from behind in order to tie the Seahawks and force overtime. Sophomore **Mary Green (Merrick, NY/Calhoun)** sent a cross to senior **Holly Tyser (Somers, CT/Somers)** in the 71st minute. Tyser was able to strike the ball with her left foot and score into the right side netting. The Bulldogs outshot the Seahawks 26-7 in the contest. The tie against WC marked the end of the 2009 season for BU.

Central Connecticut State (11-6-2, 9-0-1 NEC)

The 2008 NEC champions will have a chance to defend their title at home beginning this weekend. The Blue Devils finished the conference regular season 9-0-1 in league play to claim the regular season title and the right to host the tournament for the fifth time in their history. The previous four times Central has won the tournament title. The Blue Devils finished off their regular season with a 5-1 victory over Saint Francis (PA) and a 4-0 win over Robert Morris. The Blue Devils finished the season with a 7-0-1 record in their final eight games and outscored their opponents 30-6 in that span. In 10 conference games this season CCSU outscored their opponents 33-8. They finished unbeaten in league action for the fifth time in their history in the NEC and for the first time since 2005. They have not finished lower than third in the league standings since the 2001 season. The Blue Devils have won seven league titles and are looking for number eight this weekend where they will face off against No. 4 seed Long Island at 11:00 a.m. on Friday in New Britain. The championship game will be played on Sunday at 1:00 p.m. Central is looking to win the title for the fifth time at home. They did it in 1997, 1998, 2002 and 2005. Senior **Leah Blayney (Katoomba, New South Wales/Auburn University)** had a strong weekend for the Blue Devils posting a goal and two assists in each game. She finishes the season as Central's leading scorer with 10 goals and 13 assists, good for 33 points. The 33 points are the third-highest single season total in program history behind 49 from Jane McFarlane in 1997 and 38 from Kelly Shimming in 2003. Both players were named the conference's player of the year following their performance. Her 13 assists this year are the second-highest single season total in school history behind 16 from Shimming in 2003. Junior **Beth Lloyd (Reading, England/Oaklands College)** continued her torrid scoring pace in the NEC, posting four goals and a pair of assists in a 2-0 week. Lloyd, who finished the regular season with a team-high 11 goals, scored two goals and added an assist in the win over SFPA at home on Friday. She scored the first goal of the game for Central then later assisted on a goal and scored the final goal of the game. On Sunday, she matched her performance from Friday, posting another two goals and adding an assist. The junior scored the first and second goals of the game for CCSU in the 4-0 win over RMU and then assisted on the third goal. She finished the year with 11 goals in her final 12 games, which tie for the third-highest single season total in school history. Nine of her goals on the year came against league opponents, and she had four game-winners. Senior netminder **Caity Casey (Guilford, CT/Branford)** had a stellar week for the Blue Devils in a pair of games allowing just one goal in the victory over SFPA making two saves in 62 minutes of action and three more saves in 73 minutes of play in the shutout of RMU to secure CCSU's fifth shutout of the season.

Fairleigh Dickinson (2-15-1, 0-9-1 NEC)

The Knights wrapped up the 2009 season with a 0-2 week, falling to Mount St. Mary's 3-1 on Friday and Monmouth 6-0 on Sunday afternoon. Senior **Jennifer Arceneaux (Arvada, CO/Ralston Valley)** and sophomore **Rashidah Sherman (Pelham Manor, NY/Pelham Memorial)** finished the season tied for the team lead with eight points and three goals. The four graduating seniors - Arceneaux, **Emma Howes (Avalon Beach, Sydney, Australia/Fairfield/Barranjoey)**, **Megan MacKellar (Lilbrun, GA/Brookwood)** and **Christine Niven (Middleboro, MA/Middleboro)** - were honored in a ceremony prior to kickoff on Sunday. Against the Mountaineers, **Julie Woolridge (St. John's, Newfoundland/Bishops College)** scored on a corner kick from the left side in the 13th minute. The goal was the first of the season for the sophomore and was unassisted.

Long Island (9-7-1, 5-4-1 NEC)

Long Island closed the regular season with a 1-0 win over Bryant on Oct. 30. The Blackbirds won their final three games and went unbeaten in their final four to qualify for the Northeast Conference Tournament. LIU posted shutouts in each of the final three games to push its season total to eight, which ranks second in the NEC. Sophomore **Jessica Roelant's (Flemington, NJ/Hunterdon Central)** first goal of the year proved to be the game-winner against BU. Freshman **Katie Egan (Hanover, MA/Hanover)** and junior **Caitlin Meadows (Brookdale, CA/San Lorenzo Valley)** got credit for the assist. Freshman **Jennifer Bannon (East Greenwich, RI/East Greenwich)** made five saves for the shutout. Bannon ranks second in the NEC in goals against average (0.63) and shutouts (8) while leading the league in save percentage (.871). LIU will face Central Connecticut

State in the NEC Tournament Friday at 11:00 a.m. The teams tied in the regular season and will be meeting in a rematch of last year's championship game.

Monmouth (13-4-1, 8-1-1 NEC)

Monmouth finished the regular season after going 2-0 on the road this week. The Hawks, who posted six straight shutouts, have posted 12 shutouts so far this season, which include 12 out of the last 16 outings. Junior goalkeeper **Lia Fierro (Short Hills, NJ/Millburn)** improved her career shutout total to 27 after her shutouts this weekend. The 12 shutouts for the junior set a new single-season record for Fierro. Lori Houlihan set the program record for single-season shutouts in 1995 with 15. Fierro, who has played every minute in goal for the Hawks this season, now has a career record of 37-13-6. Junior forward **Mary Wilks (Bridgeton, NJ/Bridgeton)**, who now has five game-winners on the season, has a team-leading point total of 27 after she added four goals and an assist this weekend, good for 44 in her career. Wilks, who has scored a goal in three straight matches twice this season, now has 17 career scores, the second-most by an active player. **Andrea Lopez (Oakhurst, NJ/Ocean Township)**, who now has 30 career goals to lead active players – 8th all-time –, increased her career point total to 84 with her goal at Fairleigh Dickinson on Sunday. She stands seventh on MU's all-time scoring list leaving her six points away from overtaking Katie Sands (89; 2002-05). The senior added her 16th career game-winning score against Saint Francis (PA) last weekend. Monmouth set a new season-high of six goals on Sunday at FDU, which were the most goals scored by the Hawks since posting a 5-0 victory at Mount St. Mary's last season on Oct. 25. Junior captain **Ali Kliment (Florence, NJ/The Pennington School)** added an assist on Sunday, giving the defender 10 points on the season, a career-best. MU has not lost consecutive home matches since 2005, and finished the year 5-3-1 at home this season. The Hawks are 8-1 on the road. Monmouth, now playing in its league-leading 13th overall NEC Tournament, has appeared in 10 postseasons under head coach Krissy Turner, including four straight. MU has lost in the first round in two of the last three seasons but won it all in 2007 after capturing the regular season championship. During Monmouth's four-year stretch of qualifying for the NEC Tournament, the Hawks have posted 28 victories in NEC play. Turner is 5-7-1 in nine NEC Tournament trips. MU will face Quinnipiac in this year's NEC Tournament on Friday at 1:30 p.m. and last faced the Bobcats in the 1999 and 2000 NEC Tournaments, both of which were won by QU.

Mount St. Mary's (6-11-2, 4-5-1 NEC)

The Mount closed out the regular season with a 3-1 victory at Fairleigh Dickinson and a 5-1 loss to Sacred Heart. In the win over FDU, freshman **Kelly Baker (Cinnaminson, NJ/Cinnaminson)** scored her first two collegiate goals to pace the Mount to victory. Senior **Emily Menotti (Dover, PA/Dover Area)** had the game-winner, her fourth of the season. Menotti finished her career at the Mount with 15 goals and 38 points. She is fourth all-time at MSM in career points (38) and her 15 goals are tied for fourth on the all-time list. **Sadie Winship (York, PA/Eastern York)** played both games in goal for the Mount for the injured **Alicia Miller (Lititz, PA/Warwick)**. Winship made a combined 11 saves in the two games. The sophomore is regularly a starting forward for MSM, and she finished the season second on the team with five goals and 11 points. Miller closed the year with 117 saves and a 1.77 goals against average. The Mount's six wins this year were the most by a Mount team since the 2003 squad went 6-9-2. The Mount went 4-5-1 in NEC play, its best league record since the 2000 team went 5-5-0. MSM's final record of 6-11-2 was a four-win improvement over last year's 2-16-1 mark.

Quinnipiac (8-6-2, 7-2-1 NEC)

The Bobcats shut out their opponents in a 2-0 weekend against Robert Morris and Saint Francis (PA). After their 3-0 blanking of RMU on Friday, Oct. 30, the Bobcats secured the third place ranking in the Northeast Conference clinching a bid into the postseason tournament. Sophomore forward **Furtuna Velaj (Stamford, CT/Westhill)** scored all three goals for the Bobcats, notching her third hat trick of her career and the second against RMU. Freshmen **Jillian Strassner (Avon, CT/Avon)** and **Shauna Edwards (Southington, CT/Southington)** each assisted on Velaj's second tally of the game, recording their third and second assists of the season, respectively. Velaj's three goals increase her team lead to 11 goals this season, earning her 30 points total, just one point away from her season tally in her rookie year. Sunday was the Bobcats final regular-season game and held Senior Day festivities before the 1:00 p.m. kickoff. In true Senior Day fashion, the lone goal of the game was scored by senior forward **Lindsay Oliveri (Waltham, MA/Waltham)**, good for the second goal of her career. Sophomore **Kristina Del Mistro (East Williston, NY/The Wheatley School)** picked up her second assist of the season on the play. Goalkeepers **Biz Cook (Appleton, WI/Appleton North)** and **Kendra Margulies (Weston, MA/Weston)** combined efforts in both shutouts. Cook saw 141 minutes in net, tallying 15 saves, while Margulies appeared in the remaining 39 minutes, pulling down three saves overall. The Bobcats will return to action when they play against the second-seeded Monmouth Hawks on Friday, Nov. 6 at 1:30 p.m.

Robert Morris (8-9-1, 4-5-1 NEC)

Robert Morris ended its 2009 season with losses at Quinnipiac (0-3) and Central Connecticut State (0-4). The 2009 squad tied the team records for wins with eight overall and four in the NEC. RMU tied the team record for shutouts this season, posting seven in 18 games. Junior **Christy Baldesberger (South Park, PA/South Park)** was named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District II Second Team. Baldesberger is carrying a 3.80 quality point average while majoring in elementary education. Freshman goalkeeper **Jessica Olin (New Port Richey, FL/River Ridge)** put her name all over the record book, setting records for wins (eight) and shutouts (seven). She also has top five marks for save percentage (.795), goals allowed (24) and goals against average (1.43). Sophomore **Ayana Davis (Mt. Laurel, NJ/Holy Cross)** tallied nine goals this season, the fourth-highest total in team history and putting her fourth overall. Senior **Daneen Stevenato (North York, Ontario/Newtonbrook)** finished her career with 24 points, 11th all-time at RMU. Her eight assists are tied for sixth most in a career. RMU went 5-2 at home this season, tying the team mark for most home wins.

Sacred Heart (8-9-1, 4-5-1 NEC)

Senior **Mary Dick (Massapequa, NY/Saint John the Baptist)** scored her first goal of the season in the final game of her career, converting on a penalty kick in the 73rd minute against Mount St. Mary's. **Ashley Testani (Monroe, CT/Masuk)** earned an assist in the final game of her career, sending a through ball to sophomore **Samantha Kee (Haskell, NJ/Lakeland Regional)**. SHU outshot the Mountaineers 27-10 and 15-4 in the first half.

Saint Francis (PA) (8-8-2, 5-5 NEC)

With five players out for the season, Saint Francis (PA) struggled in Connecticut and finished the season one spot shy of making the playoffs. One of the highlights of the weekend was **Brianna Butcher's (East Longmeadow, MA/East Longmeadow)** first goal of the season against Central Connecticut State. Her regular position is goalkeeper, but she played at forward this season. **Rachael Seibert (Murrysville, PA/Franklin Regional)** sent a pass over to the freshman who put the ball in the back of the net. On Sunday, the Red Flash couldn't convert and were forced to take a 1-0 loss. Goalkeeper **Jessica Boyer (Pittsburgh, PA/Mount Lebanon)** had 11 saves in the game. **Brittini Greninger (Chicora, PA/Kairns City)** led the team with five shots.

Wagner (3-13-3, 1-7-2 NEC)

The Seahawks wrapped-up its season with a 1-0-1 week. In the week's first game, a stellar attack by both the Seahawks offense and defense produced a 3-0 victory over NJIT. Sophomore **Jen Emigholz (Staten Island, NY/Moore Catholic)** earned her first career shutout in the game while senior **Dominique Bonura (Hasbrouck Heights, NJ/Immaculate Heart Academy)**, sophomore **Kaitlyn Llewellyn (Island Lake, IL/Wauconda)** and freshman **Julie Vigliotti (Staten Island, NY/Notre Dame Academy)** all tallied goals in the game. Wagner capped off the season with a 1-1 double overtime tie in their final game of the week. Junior **Brianna Vassallo (Saddle Brook, NJ/Paramus Catholic)** produced the Seahawk tying goal, which kept them in the game. WC finished its 2009 season with the tie.
